Outside of her school activities, Aleya has been keeping very busy. Last summer, Aleya completed the CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant) class at Southwest Tech and has been working 10 hours per week at Schmitt Woodland Hills.

She really enjoys her job and feels it is a great learning experience and will help prepare her for a future career in nursing or a similar medical field. She hopes to continue with track and pole vault during her college career, although she is

currently undecided which college she will attend.

Aleya has been invited to compete in the Down Under Sports Tournaments for track and field on the Gold Coast of Australia in July 2019. She is excited to have this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to represent Wisconsin in this international meet. During their time in Australia, the athletes will have 2 days of practice and 3 days of competition. They will have some time for sight-seeing in Australia, including a wildlife sanctuary, kangaroo fields, and even getting to hold a koala bear.

Aleya's favorite event in track is the pole vault. As a freshman, she cleared 8' at the first high school meet. Her personal best height was 9' 6" and she qualified for Sectionals. Last year she was honored to be one of fou High School pole vaulters to qualify for

year she was honored to be one of four Richland Center High School pole vaulters to qualify for state. She cleared 10' 3" at Sectionals and 10' at the WIAA State tournament in LaCrosse. This year, her personal goal is to clear 11' 6" before the season is over. She is also trying triple jump this year for the first time and has qualified for the state indoor meet in Whitewater on April 6th for both pole vault and triple jump. Her other regular events include the 400-meter dash and various sprint relays.

Down Under Sports was founded in February 1989 based upon the dream of a New Zealander by the name of George O'Scanlon. As a young man growing up in his native country of New Zealand, George fell in love with athletics, especially American football. His desire, over the years, has been to promote football, not only to the people of New Zealand, but also to Australia where he lived for many years. That is why George started the Down

Under Bowl which eventually led to the establishment of the Down Under Hoops Classic and the Down Under International Games. The Down Under Sports programs use the common language of sports to bridge the continents and provide a forum for athletes from around the globe to compete head-to-head in the sports they love. During the past thirty years, Down Under Sports has had the opportunity to share the land down under with tens of thousands of individuals from across the United States.

The 2019 Down Under Sports program will include competition in football, cheer, golf, cross country, track and field, basketball, volleyball and soccer. Down Under Sports' goal is to continue to provide athletes who excel in their sport the opportunity to experience the culture, beauty and grandeur of the land down under, all within the framework of spirited and intense competition.

Each student athlete must raise the money to cover the cost of the ten day Australia Tournament Package. Schmitt Woodland Hills will see that Aleya receives the money donated for her trip.

SWH ANNOUNCES NEW ADULT DAY CENTER PRESS RELEASE

After considerable study and conversations with area agencies, Schmitt Woodland Hills has made the decision to open an Adult Day Care Center on their campus in Richland Center. The Center will be called the Woodland Adult Day Center.

The primary objective of the Adult Day Center program will be to provide services to adults who need enriched social or health-supportive experiences, or who may need assistance with activities of daily living, supervision and/or protection. Services may include personal services including eating, bathing, grooming, medication administration, supervision, and assistance in the use of adaptive equipment. It could also include, provision of snacks, transportation, and activities designed to meet physical, social and leisure time needs. Services include supervision and training based on individual needs and desires.

This program is designed to serve people with dementia, elderly, frail elderly, persons with developmental disabilities, physical disabilities, and sensory disabilities. While this program will provide personal cares and medication administration, it will not provide skilled nursing services such as wound care, physical therapy and occupational therapy. However, therapy services may be obtained on the Schmitt Woodland Hills campus on an out-patient basis.

The new Program Director for the Center will be Ellen Alvin, current House Calls Coordinator at Schmitt Woodland Hills. Ellen will continue her duties with the House Calls Unit and will assume new responsibility

for the Adult Day Care Center. Officials at Schmitt Woodland Hills expect to be open by May 1st, pending licensing. Initially, the Center will be open Monday, Wednesday and Fridays from 9:00 am until 3:00 pm. Participants will be introduced to this new program gradually. Eventually the Center is expecting to be able to serve 18-24 clients with programs 5 days per week.

Program participants will be involved in the planning and implementation of the activities they will be involved in. They will also engage in individual and group activities that encourage creativity, social interaction and physical exercise. Opportunities for indoor and outdoor activities, including outings to points of interest and involvement in the general community will also be part of the program. Limited transportation services are also being considered. When asked, Jackie Carley, Executive Director of Schmitt Woodland Hills, stated that she was, "Very excited about this new program Schmitt Woodland Hills will be introducing to the community. There are very few opportunities available in this area for this type of program. Our program will not only benefit the participants but will also provide desperately needed respite for the caregivers and families of the participants as well."



BASIC LIFE SUPPORT FOR HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS

Schmitt Woodland Hills is pleased to announce that you can be certified in the newly released 2019 BLS (Basic Life Support) at SWH. SWH is affiliated with the

American Red Cross training services.

Basic Life Support certification involves an instructor led training course designed to be taught in four hours.

All equipment and materials are supplied.

Class is taught with lectures, videos, hands on training and a 25 question test.
