In the 1930's Dr. B. I. Pippen and a few others were the first residents to show an interest in flying in Richland Center. The first airport was located on what was then known as Perkins Farm.

Phil Leyda bought a Piper J-2 in which he sold shares and started the first flying club.

In the early days of the club, farmers' fields were used to practice take offs and landings, much to the objections of the farmers. The planes always seemed to leave before the farmer's truck arrived.

Sometime near the end of the war several businessmen planned a new airport in Lone Rock.

Charlotte Newkirk was born Dec. 6, 1925. She grew up and went to school near Pleasant Ridge. When she was 13 she started working full time for Sherriff Ben McClaren, cleaning and cooking for his family and the prisoners.

Charlotte married Robert Ghastin when she was 18. They lived on a farm across from the airport and later moved to a cabin at the airport. Robert was also a pilot and sometimes they would fly together.

Charlotte worked at the Richland Airport Café and took her flight training there with Dwight "Woody" Woodard. She flew Cessna 140's and 120's and was the first licensed female pilot in Richland County and the first to fly solo.

Charlotte flew with her husband and flew planes to Madison to pick up parts for planes that needed repairs. She often talked about a trip with Don Julson to the Cessna plant



in Wichita to pick up a new plane. Don left ahead of her and Charlotte lost sight of him and navigated her own way back to Sextonville. The plane had the call letters N4051N and Charlotte remembers them to this day. The plane was bought by Betty Schlafer's family and later by Gus Slayback who restored it. The plane is still in Sextonville.



In the 1960's, she and Robert had 2 children, Kirk and Kathy, and she continued to run the airport restaurant and work at Keegan's Drug Store. She stopped flying but continued with the restaurant. In Feb. 1963, the night Kirk was born, the restaurant burned down and she lost her log books. She had 3-4 thousand hours in the air. She was credited with some of the hours but not all. She started doing the books for

the flying club and they gave her 2 hours per month flying time. She never got to use them all. She also worked at H&R Block for several years. While working at H&R Block, she also did the books for Richard Havlik and House of Richard hair salon. She was the bookkeeper for Huffman's Hair Design and bought it in the 1980's and ran it until 1999 when it was taken over by Connie's Creations.

Robert passed away in 1971. In 1974 Charlotte met George Bindl, a farmer from Plain and later married him.

She kept her pilot license for years and was a member of the Richland Flying Club.

Charlotte loved to travel. She and George visited Europe several times and visited her brother in Washington State often.

Even today at age 96, she would love to go back up in a small plane.

In 2006, Dr. Samuel Weinstein, the chief of pediatric cardio-thoracic surgery for a major hospital in New York, traveled to El Salvador to perform life-saving operations on children with severe heart problems. One of his may patients was an eight-year-old boy named Francisco. During his surgery, Francisco lost too much blood. He required an immediate transfusion, but his blood type was B negative – a blood type shared by only 2% of the population. His chances of survival were slim.

Until Dr. Weinstein began rolling up his own sleeve. He shared the same rare blood type as Francisco. So, Dr. Weinstein laid down his surgical tools, scrubbed his arm and let a nurse draw a pint of blood. When he restarted the surgery on Francisco, it was his own blood that flowed through the little boy's veins and likely saved his life.

That's what God did on our behalf. That's what we celebrate at Christmas. When our lives were at stake, when nothing else could save us, God laid down His own majesty and authority to come in the form of a helpless baby, born to a poor family living under the control of an oppressive government. He lived the life of a traveling Rabbi and died a humiliating and agonizing death to save us from our sins. He gave up everything to ensure that we could live in God's presence forever. 




